
Dear Fellow Members,

In October, 2018 I took over as chair of the National Handcraft committee from our now National President Josephine Helly. We congratulate Josephine on her election and wish her a very successful term as our National President. She is a hard act to follow but I will do my best.

The other members of the Committee are Elsie Moxham, Longford Federation, Eileen Bateson, Kildare, Eleanor Calnan, Cork, Ethel Patterson, Donegal and Bronwen Murray, Dublin. We look forward to working together and will all meet as a committee, for the first time, at Handcraft Week which takes place from the 8th. to the 12th. Of April. Since taking over most of my time has gone into organising this week. The house and bungalows are fully booked so it will be a busy week, as always.

We are to continue with the taster classes in 58, Merrion Road, (central office) as they proved such a success previously and Bronwen has agreed to organise them. Thank you Bronwen. The tutors give their time for free, with the class participants just paying for the kits provided on the day. The fee for the class goes to "An Grianán" They are held on the 2nd. Monday of the month. The next class is on the 13th. May, and there will be a class in June. They recommence in September to November. January is fluid, depending on the weather . February and March are definite but there isn't any class in April on account of Handcraft week and Easter. Booking through Central office.

Our main function in the year is Handcraft Week followed closely by the Knitting and Stitching Show. As a member of G.A.N.S (Guilds-Association, Network and Societies), I.C.A is represented at meetings by a member of the National Hand Craft Committee and The National Arts Committee. Janet Edgeley, National Arts Committee and myself attended our first meeting in Dublin Castle on the 7th. March , it was very informative but speaking personally I have a lot to learn.

Our principle aim, as a committee, is to promote and keep alive the traditional crafts . Members need encouragement to develop their skills in the traditional crafts and with that in mind we would like at some future date to meet the Federation craft promoters to discuss how this might be achieved. Not everyone is aware that they can still do proficiency tests. Testing now takes place during Handcraft week .



Kilmurry McMahon Guild won 3rd Prize with their chosen country Dominican Republic. Their celebrated women were Minerva Mirabel and her sisters Maria-Theresa and Patria. The sisters were murdered. The UN designated date in their memory is 25th November which is called the International Day for the Elimination of violence against women. Guild members wore the butterfly in their memory. Their national flag is the only one in the world that depicts the bible.

Well done to all guild for taking part and their work, research and presentation was a credit to them.

Child Protection - A Synopsis

Parents and guardians have the primary responsibility for the care and protection of their children. However, society also has a duty to promote the welfare and safety of children. The wider community of relatives, friends, neighbours, professionals and voluntary workers are well placed to be aware of a child's welfare. They should know how to recognise and respond to the possibility of abuse or neglect, so as to ensure that the most effective steps are taken to protect a child and to contribute to the ongoing safety of children.

Child welfare and protection policy is based on a legal framework provided primarily by the Child Care Act 1991 and the Children First Act 2015. There are a number of key principles of child protection and welfare. These are:

The safety and welfare of children is everyone's responsibility.

The best interests of the child should be paramount.

The overall aim in all dealings with children and their families is to intervene proportionally to support families to keep children safe from harm.

Interventions by the State should build on existing strengths and protective factors in the family.

Early intervention is key to getting better outcomes.

Children should only be separated from parents/guardians when alternative means of protecting them have been exhausted.

Children have a right to be heard, listened to and taken seriously.

Parents/guardians have a right to respect, and should be consulted and involved in matters that concern their family A proper balance must be struck between protecting children and respecting the rights and needs of parents / guardians and families.

Child protection is multiagency, multidisciplinary activity.

The Children First Act 2015 places a number of statutory obligations on specific groups of professionals and on particular organisations providing services to children. Best practice should be in place for all organisations providing services to children. Through the provision of the Act, it is intended to:

Raise awareness of child abuse and neglect.

Provide for mandatory reporting by key professionals.

Improve child safeguarding arrangements in organisations providing services to children.

Provide for cooperation and information-sharing between agencies when Tulsa – Child and Family Agency, is undertaking child protection assessments.

The Irish Countrywomen's Association do carry out activities within guilds / federations and activities in An Grianán where our members come in contact with children. Therefore, we have decided to implement a Child Protection Programme containing a Risk Assessment, Child Safeguarding Statement, polices and training as necessary. A Child Protection Sub Working Group was developed. The ICA obtained the services of a Child Protection expert (Olive Ring) who is contracted by the Carmichael Training Centre in Dublin. Olive carries out Child Protection training and develops child safety systems for many organisations throughout the country. To date the Risk Assessment for child protection for ICA is in process and the Child Safeguarding Statement is at review stage with the sub working group. At this current time there is no intention to review the membership age within ICA. An overall Child Protection Policy will be developed, further information on training will go out to guild members after this work is complete.
